

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed, by their Creator, with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are <u>life</u>, <u>liberty</u>, and the pursuit of Happiness. - from the Declaration of Independence

On June 7, 1776, when the Continental Congress met at the Pennsylvania State House (later Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the Virginia delegate Richard Henry Lee introduced a motion calling for the colonies' independence. Amid heated debate, Congress postponed the vote on Lee's resolution, but appointed a five man committee including Thomas Jefferson of Virginia, John Adams of Massachusetts, Roger of Connecticut, Benjamin Sherman Franklin of Pennsylvania and Robert R. Livingston of New York - to draft a formal statement justifying the break with Great Britain. On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of Lee's resolution for independence in a near unanimous vote (the New York delegation

abstained, but later voted affirmatively). On that day, John Adams wrote to his wife Abigail that July 2nd "will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival" and that the celebration should include "Pomp and Parade...Games, Bonfires Sports, Guns, Bells, and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other." On July 4th, the Continental Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, which had been written largely by Jefferson. Though the vote for actual independence took place on July 2nd, from then on the 4th became the day that was celebrated as the birth of American independence.

FUN FACTS ABOUT THE 4TH OF JULY

- Only John Hancock actually signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4th, 1776. All the others signed later.
- The Declaration of Independence was signed by 56 men from 13 colonies.
- The average age of the signers was 45. The youngest was Thomas Lynch, Jr. (27) of South Carolina. The oldest delegate was Benjamin Franklin (70) of Pennsylvania.
- Eight of the 56 signers were born in Britain.
- John Adams believed that July 2nd was the correct date on which to celebrate the birth of American Independence and would turn down invitations to appear at July 4th events in protest.
- John Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died on July 4, 1826 the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence.
- The stars on the original American Flag were in a circle so all of the colonies would appear equal.
- In 1776, there were 2.5 million people living in the new nation. Today the population of the United States is 331 million.
- Every 4th of July, the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia is tapped (not actually rung) 13 times in honor of the original 13 colonies.
- The White House celebrated Independence Day for the first time in 1801.
- July 4th was made an official holiday by Congress in 1870.
- Written on the back of the Declaration of Independence are these words, "Original Declaration of Independence dates 4th July 1776". It is believed that this text was added as a label, as during that time parchments were often rolled up during transport.

IT TOOK 442 DAYS FOR INDEPENDENCE TO BECOME AN ACCEPTED THOUGHT. There were 442 days between the "Shot Heard 'Round the World" fired at Lexington and Concord to the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. The majority of colonists viewed themselves as British subjects, and even when fighting broke out in Massachusetts in April 1775 it was considered a civil dispute. The thought of separation was seen as a radical and nonsensical notion. It wasn't until October 1775 when King George III denounced the colonies in front of Parliament that American colonists agreed they should become an independent nation, as they felt their rights as British citizens were being denied.



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
